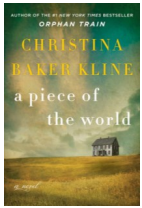

By Christina Baker Kline

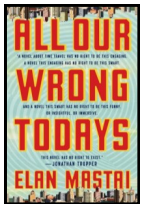

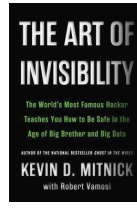


### The Lonely Hearts Hotel
